# Overview

In eighteenth-century France, there were intense debates about music—about music's relation to nature and culture, mathematics and language, reason and emotion; about melody, harmony, tuning, and tonal organization; about music's origins, and its social or political functions. This course brings those debates to life through Reacting to the Past pedagogy, a student-centred approach that teaches history through *immersive role-playing games*. In a series of games, you will take on the roles of historical figures, read primary texts, discuss and write about key ideas, strategize with your allies, and try to outwit your opponents. The games will offer new perspectives on music and Enlightenment thought, including many musical issues and questions that are still relevant today.

#### **Outcomes**

By the end of this course, you'll have detailed knowledge of the music and culture of eighteenth-century France; you will have strengthened skills in critical reading, music analysis, and verbal and written communication; and you'll be able to evaluate philosophical issues in music theory and aesthetics.

# **Materials**

Readings and resources will be available via OWL. Additional resources will be on reserve at the Music Library. We will use Discord to facilitate game-related communication, so if you don't already have one, you will need to create a free Discord account.

Before gameplay begins for *Music Theory at the Académie Royale des Sciences* and *The Querelle des Bouffons*, you must complete a *historical information quiz* (multiple-choice, online via OWL). During each of those games, you will complete a relevant *character assignment*, which involves research related to your role. By the end of those games, you will also choose a game-related *writing assignment* to submit for grading. At the end of the course, you will submit a *reflection essay*.

*Participation* will be assessed for each session of gameplay, according to rubrics that I will provide. To do well, you will need to engage actively in discussion and be prepared to pursue your victory objectives and inhabit your role. Reading the assigned texts and listening to the assigned repertoire will be essential for successful preparation.

- i) Course Prerequisites: Music 2651A/B or the former Music 2650A/B, Music 2641U or the former Music 2636A/B. Unless you have either the prerequisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.
- ii) Grading scale: A+=90-100%, A=80-89%, B=70-79%, C=60-69%, D=50-59%, F=0-49%.
- iii) Academic Consideration for Student Absence & Missing Work (≥10%): Students are responsible for making up any missed classes or assignments as soon as possible. The University recognizes that a student's ability to meet their academic responsibilities may,

on occasion, be impaired by medical illness. Illness may be acute (short term), or it may be chronic (long term), or chronic with acute episodes. The University further recognizes that medical situations are deeply personal and respects the need for privacy and confidentiality in these matters. However, in order to ensure fairness and consistency for all students, academic accommodation for work representing 10% or more of the student's overall grade in the course shall be granted only in those cases where there is documentation indicating that the student was seriously affected by illness and could not reasonably be expected to meet their academic responsibilities.

Documentation shall be submitted, as soon as possible, to the Office of the Associate Dean, Undergraduate (TC210), together with a request for relief specifying the nature of the accommodation being requested. Whenever possible, students who require academic accommodation should provide notification and documentation in advance of due dates, examinations, etc. Students must follow up with their professors and their Academic Counselling office in a timely manner.

- iv) Academic Consideration for Missing Work (<10%): In cases where students miss work that is worth less than 10% of the total course grade (ie. two or fewer assignments) due to medical illness or compassionate grounds, if documentation is voluntarily submitted to the Associate Dean's office and the Associate Dean grants an accommodation, then the missed assignment(s) or quiz(zes) will be discounted in the calculation of the final grade for the course. If documentation is not voluntarily submitted then the missed assignment(s) will receive a grade of zero. Students who have been denied accommodation by an instructor may appeal this decision to the Associate Dean's office but will be required to present appropriate documentation.
