PREREQUISITE

MUS 2942y (Italian/German lyric diction) or Similar

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Intensive study of French lyric diction and mélodie performance practice; including IPA assignments, tests, transcription and pronunciation practice, study of French composers of song, and performances of three songs. The second semester involves application of lyric diction study in 3 performances of works in French and English by Canadian composers and by contemporary French composers. Study and performance of French opera recitatives will be included. Songs will be assigned for the Winter semester. Students will choose their own songs in the fall semester.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

For the student to learn correct pronunciation of French in singing, to gain facility in the use of IPA for this purpose, and to build an understanding of the syntax and word stress of the French language and French poetry used in French art song. Singers are to gain basic knowledge of composers of mélodie and learn the correct interpretive style for singing mélodie, employing it in performance.

The Coursepack is required in class in the first 6 weeks of fall semester.

The Bernac is required in class from Week 8-12.

There will be required readings from Bernac in the first 6 weeks of the fall semester.

COURSE PIANISTS

Pianists are assigned to this course to accompany you. Decide your songs early, and prepare the scores for your assigned pianist, providing them the music no later than **Oct. 4th.** It is your responsibility to book a rehearsal with your pianist to take place in the 2 weeks preceding your class performances. If you do not arrange a rehearsal, the pianist is not obliged to accompany you, and you must provide your own pianist for your performance. It is your responsibility to know the text and the score when you arrive at your rehearsal. For **SONG C** you must provide a copy of your song to the pianist by **NOVEMBER 8th.** This song must be memorized.

COMMUNICATION

Important class announcements and information may be sent to you by email. It is your responsibility to check your e-mail regularly and respond as necessary.

MÉLODIE PERFORMANCE & ACCOMPANYING WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS Performances:

Fall Semester: You will perform two songs in class; one each chosen from List A and B (following). *One will be sung from memory*. The Exam performance of Song C will be performed in January from memory. Our library has an excellent collection of French art song. Use this rather than online sources. Your performance will include recitation (memorization encouraged) of the song text in French and demonstrated knowledge of both the word-for-word translation and the poetic meaning. With consultation, performing songs not found on the list is allowed. All songs from Debussy forward should be sung in original keys. Indication of correct keys can be found in composers' Works list in *New Grove Dictionary of Music*.

Winter Semester: You will perform one song in English and one in French by a Canadian composer, and one song by a contemporary French composer. Solo and group recitatives will be performed. All songs and recitative repertoire will be assigned. All performances in French will require the IPA and translation as described below. A song profile is required for each song performed.

If due to illness or family emergency you are unable to sing on the day you are scheduled, you must notify me and your pianist as soon as possible, and always PRECEDING CLASS TIME by telephone, text or email. Be sure the contact is confirmed.

Written Assignments:

- 1. **Song IPA**: Texts of songs must be written out in French, IPA and English on three consecutive lines. Word-for-word translation and IPA *must be written by hand. Keep a copy. DUE:* 2 weeks before your performance in hard copy. The corrected work will be returned to you the following week in class.
- 2. **Song Profile**: Due at the beginning of class the day of your performance.
- 3. **Listening Assignment:** May be handed in anytime up until NOV. 23rd.

Listen to a single CD of French mélodie. Write a report, listing the composer, title and date of recording, performers and the label. Provide an outline of what you found to be the most important details in the music and the poetry, as well as the interpretation and vocalism. For EIGHT (8) songs, give the song title and the poet's name, voice type and tessitura, vocal difficulties of the song and a short précis of the meaning of the text (not a translation). This must be presented in hard copy; preferably typed.

FALL MIDTERM EXAM

This written exam will include IPA transcription, as well as questions on vocabulary and on diction rules.

ELECTRONICS
