Course Descriptiona

Through lectures, student-professor discussion in seminars, presentations and a paper, we will explore Otakar Sevcik's *School of Bowing Technique*, op. 2. Through our examination of this text, we will ask:

- -how does Sevcik organize his materials?
- -in what order does he explore the function of various parts of the right arm and hand, strokes and articulations, rhythms, parts of the bow, bow speed, string crossings, string lengths, multiple stops, contact points, and dynamics
- -why does he explore the above in that order? What values do his subject material and their order reflect?
- -what ramifications does this have on our performing?
- -what ramifications does this have on our teaching?

Attendance is mandatory.

After they are finished with this course, I hope that students know more about Sevcik, bowing technique, and how to teach it.

Accomodation for Medical Illness

In order to ensure fairness and consistency for all students, academic accommodation for work representing more than 30% of the student's overall grade in the course shall be granted only in those cases where there is documentation in the form of a completed and appropriately signed Student Medical Certificate (SMC)

indicating that the student was seriously affected by illness and could not reasonably be expected to meet his/her academic responsibilities, or the equivalent documentation for non-medical or compassionate grounds. Students seeking academic consideration must communicate with their instructors no later than 24 hours after the end of the period covered by either the self-reported absence or SMC, or immediately upon their return following a documented absence, to clarify how they will be expected to fulfil the academic expectations they may have missed during the absence. Documentation, if required shall be submitted to the Office of the Associate Dean, Undergraduate (TC210).
