## Music 9536 The School of Notre Dame in the Thirteenth Century Spring Semester 2025

Instructor: James Grier

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The course will examine the history of the cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris during the thirteenth century and the musical community established there. We shall consider the three principal manuscripts that preserve the tradition, the repertories practised there and the individuals who contributed to musical practices at the cathedral. Students will choose a research topic for oral seminar presentation and final submission in written form.

## **EVALUATION:**

Seminar and Essay 100%

Students will choose their essay topic in consultation with the instructor. The seminar presentations will be based on the essay topics.
