COURSE PREREQUISITE

COURSE GOALS & OBJECTIVES

The Salsa Band is a musical performance group that is open to music majors and non-music majors enrolled at the university. Students rehearse and perform standard and contemporary repertoire with special emphasis given to interactive playing, improvisation, and developing appropriate stylistic competency and techniques.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to demonstrate the following learning outcomes:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of style and important historical aspects of the music performed.
- 2. Apply proper style and interpretation into performance practice.
- 3. Recognize and use appropriate rhythmic and melodic patterns and articulations for a given style.
- 4. Combine musical and communicative skills acquired to formulate unique interpretations of standard repertoire

COURSE MATERIALS

There are no required textbooks for this course. All performers should have access to a tuner and a metronome. Players are expected to bring their instrument, sheet music, music stand, all necessary mutes/equipment, and a pencil to every rehearsal. The use of tablets, instead of paper sheet music, is optional and up to the discretion of each player. The use of apps or software for creating play-along recordings (e.g., iRealb Pro, Band in a Box) and transcription aids (e.g., Amazing Slow Downer, Capo) is strongly recommended.

Keyboard, keyboard amp, bass amp, drum set, Afro-Cuban percussion, vocal PA, and microphones will be provided for rehearsals and performances.

<u>All band members are REQUIRED</u> to collect, setup/breakdown, and return school gear from/to MB27 for performances. *Failure to participate will negatively impact student marks.*

For rehearsals, <u>all band members are strongly encouraged</u> to contribute to setting up and breaking down, and storing school gear.

COURSE POLICIES

In order to reach our peak performance, a number of activities must take place.

- 1. Weekly sectionals are required. Students are responsible for coordinating sectional rehearsals with their section colleagues. It is recommended that you find a time that is recurring.
- 2. Individual parts must be learned outside of the ensemble rehearsal times.
- 3. Each member of the ensemble will be responsible for sheet music, all peripherals (mutes, reeds, cords, etc.), and a pencil. In addition, students' preparedness and ability to execute their music along with their rehearsal etiquette will factor into their mark.
- 4. Recordings related to the repertoire will be placed on the course OWL page, and ensemble members are expected to study these recordings thoroughly.

Grades will be determined on the following bases:

- (a) Rehearsal preparation, Performances, Gear setup/breakdown/storage, assignments 80%
- (b) Participation 20%

Preparation for rehearsals means each individual is responsibly preparing their part for correct execution. If the director warns an individual during rehearsal about preparedness, this means that the individual has not prepared the music in a timely manner. Repeated warnings will reduce the grade due to the lack of preparation.

Characteristics of an A

- Always has music prepared for rehearsal
- Always punctual for rehearsals and performances
- Music performed in concert with no or very few errors
- Superior rehearsal attitude and decorum; is alert in rehearsal
- Always contributes to school gear setup/breakdown

Characteristics of a B

- Music prepared for rehearsal 80-90% of the time
- Sometimes late for rehearsal
- Music performed in concert with minor, noticeable errors
- Good rehearsal attitude and decorum; sometimes not paying attention
- Usually contributes to school gear setup/breakdown

Characteristics of a C

- Music prepared for rehearsal 70-80% of the time
- Significant number of tardies (2-5)
- Music is prepared by concert, but not before
- Music performed in concert with numerous minor errors and missed notes
- Contributes nothing more to rehearsal than playing notes
- Average student rehearsal decorum occasional talking/off-task in rehearsal
- Sometimes contributes to school gear setup/breakdown

Characteristics of a D

- Music not prepared by concert with many (mostly minor) errors
- Significantly number of tardies (5-10)
- Music mostly unprepared for rehearsal
- Music at concert performed with some major errors and many minor errors throughout

- Exhibits occasional negative attitude resulting in conference with Director; frequently offtask
- Not present for equipment set-up/breakdown

Characteristics of an F

- Usually unprepared for rehearsal
- Always tardy to rehearsal
- Music at concert performed with major errors and/or omissions throughout
- Not present for equipment set-up/breakdown
